

#### **Background**

After a registered nurse joins our register for the first time they may then gain additional NMC qualifications to specialise in different types of specialist community nursing. This includes community children's nurses, community learning disabilities nurses, community mental health nurses, district nurses and general practice nurses.

Registered nurses and midwives may also gain additional qualifications in specialist community public health nursing (SCPHN). This includes health visitors, occupational health nurses and school nurses.

We hold all these qualification details on our register. At any time, members of the public can look on the register to see if a registered nurse or midwife holds an additional regulated qualification.

No specialist knowledge is required to complete this survey. We are seeking your views to ensure that everyone – individuals, families and communities – who use these health and care services can be confident about receiving care from specialist nurses that is safe, effective and kind, whether they're at home, in the community, or accessing public health services.

We are updating the standards (what people need to know and be able to do) for these roles and are asking for your views about the broad content of the draft standards. The draft standards are available to see on the NMC website.

The new draft standards look to emphasise the importance of:

- being able to better support the people they are caring for and in making independent decisions about their overall care and treatment in partnership with them
- leading teams and having oversight of the management of safe and respectful complex care for people in their own homes or in the community
- working with people and other community teams to understand what would make care in the community better
- the health visitor's, the occupational health nurse's and the school nurse's public health role in working with people to prevent ill health, protect health and promote wellbeing.
