Meeting notes

Agenda items covered

1 Welcome

 Nicola Smith, Assistant Director Stakeholder Engagement, welcomed attendees to the meeting and outlined the agenda and housekeeping items. This was followed by introductions.

2 Introduction to nursing and midwifery standards – presentation and small group discussions

- Sue West, Senior Nursing Education Advisor, gave an introduction to the nursing and midwifery standards set by the NMC, including the Code, standards of proficiency and programme standards.
- Some of our current programme standards reflect European Union law. As the UK has left the EU, we can now make changes to them.
- The presentation then focussed on the use of simulation in nurse training, as this is an area the NMC is currently consulting stakeholders, and which will be changing.
- In three smaller groups, members shared their views on the use of simulation, focussing on these questions:
 - What do you think about simulation to supplement and support nurses' practice learning?
 - Are there any advantages or disadvantages you see?

Main themes emerging from the group discussions were:

- 1. Simulation in learning is useful, especially in the early years of training, but shouldn't replace working with real people a balance needs to be struck.
- 2. Simulation cannot replace people, in the sense of diversity of the human body, people's different characteristics, and delivering person-centred care.

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Actions:

- Discussion comments will be used to inform the consultation on simulated learning.
- The discussion and questions asked during the presentation will help frame the questions for the wider public consultation survey. The consultation starts in June 2022.

3 English language requirements – presentation and small group discussions

Natasha Dare, Head of Regulatory Policy, gave a presentation on current English language requirements.

- The group were asked to consider and share their thoughts on the following questions:
 - o Is being able to communicate well in English important?
 - Do you agree that we should check all four skills:
 - Speaking
 - Listening
 - Reading
 - o Writing?
 - o Are there other types of evidence you think we should accept?
 - What is the right balance between having high standards and unnecessarily stopping people from practising?

Main themes emerging from the group discussions were:

- Being able to communicate in English is important but other factors such as people's accents are also important.
- All skills writing reading, speaking and listening should be checked.
- There is a balance between ensuring people have the right skills and ensuring that we have enough staff, given pressures on workforce.

4 NMC and Me – public perceptions and understanding

- Kirsten Van Balen, Head of Strategic Communications, talked through the findings of recent research conducted on behalf of the NMC.
- The research focused on members of the public's views on health and care, general awareness and understanding of the NMC, and their desire to engage with the organisation.
- The group shared their initial thoughts on what the research revealed and how it could be used.

Main themes emerging from the group discussions were:

- The research confirms that, generally, the public doesn't know about the NMC and its work.
- The NMC needs to raise awareness and increase understanding.
- There is also work to do in regards to the NMC's relationship with registrants, who often view the organisation negatively, and/or don't have a sense of what they get for their registration fees.
